## U's fall short at second time of asking

Oxford were defeated at Wembley for the second consecutive year at the hands of relegation battlers Coventry.

Before the loss, the U's had suffered inconsistent form with a 2-1 loss at Oldham, late win at home to Scunthorpe 2-1, followed by a 4-2 loss to high fliers Bolton, and a bland 0-0 draw with Northampton.

Oxford seemed hopeful after their fantastic 5-1 victory against Bury, with Marvin Johnson and Joe Rothwell both scoring one, and Conor McAleny hitting his second hat-trick of the campaign after his trio away at Chesterfield just over a month before.

But, when Oxford took the hallowed turf, nothing seemed to click. Right from the off it seemed loose and disjoined, with what appeared to be the regular tactics of fast moving football, gone right out of the window.

Coventry took the lead after only 11 minutes, making it difficult. An unlucky block from Phil Edwards resulted in Gael Birigimana tapping home from a few yards out. Oxford didn't create one good chance for the rest of the half, wasting corner after corner. No real urgency seemed to grip the players, much to the fans annoyance.

The situation was made even worse ten minutes after the break, with George Thomas coolly finishing after a counter attack that shouldn't have paid off. Even after this, Oxford seemed lazy and didn't demonstrate any form of consistent tactics as seen in the past few seasons. If they had, they would have been in the lead.

With fifteen minutes left on the clock, Oxford seemed to finally wake up. After a scrap in the

box, some good skill and a fine shot saw Liam Sercombe convert right from outside the area. 2-1.

Oxford seemed to dominate from here on, but a missed Rob Hall one on one was the last best effort Oxford produced.

Coventry managed to hang on and claim their first victory at the new Wembley, thirty years on from their FA Cup win in 1987.

After what has been a great season for Oxford so far, I have to say that the team let themselves down. Coventry walked all over Oxford without reply. This is made worse by the fact that Coventry will almost certainly by relegated this year. They are not a strong team, but came out victorious on the day. Two years in a row really does sting, but the team has done incredibly well to get this far for two years running.

Only six games left in the league, let's make each and every one count before the season is up! COME ON YOU YELLOWS!

The narrow doors can be useful if your kitchen is small abut some don't open wide enough for large boxes, and the tall, narrow compartments can mean some items disappear to the back, never to be seen again!

**Built-In** - These are made to fit almost flush with cabinets and counters.

They are typically bottom-freezer or sideby-side styles and match your cabinets.

**Compact or Mini** - Perfect for a bedsit or a kitchenette. Keep in mind these models may have only one quarter the capacity of a regular fridge, but cost just as much to operate.

Always measure where you plan to put the fridge before you buy. Check too that it can fit through doorways and remember that you will need space to open the swing doors and for a one inch clearance around sides and back for adequate airflow.

Bigger is probably better as it means you can shop in bulk, and smaller models do not necessarily mean smaller running costs.

**Energy efficiency** - All new fridges are a lot more efficient than they were a decade ago. They all have to be A+ rated now. Yet even between A+ models running costs can vary widely. Your fridge runs for 24 hours per day so it makes sense to d your research. Compare the Energy Guide labels of your favoured fridges, and then compare the annual operating costs and the kilowatt-hours used per year.

Do all this and you will be a very cool customer when it comes to making your purchase.

The fridge has come of age. Gone are the days of a squat little white cupboard with a tiny freezer compartment. Fridges have gone large! Some even come with custom panels that exactly match your kitchen cabinets.

There are six basic types of fridge:


**Top Freezer** - A traditional fridge, that's good for a fairly tight spot. These tend to offer the most space for their size but need space for a wide swing of the doors. They also require you to crouch to reach the lower shelves which may be an issue if you are tall or have arthritic knees.

**Bottom Freezer** - We tend to use the freezer less so it might make good sense to have the fridge shelves at eye-level. You tend to need a larger model to get the same useable capacity as a top freezer.

**French Door** - This has two narrow doors on top, opening from the centre, and the freezer below. The space-saving smallswing doors have the added value of opening only half the fridge when stashing smaller items. They tend to be wider than top or bottom freezers.

**Side-by-Side** - With the fridge on one side and freezer on the other, these usually have through-the-door ice and water dispensers and temperature-controlled.





LIFE is a brutal space horror that had me on the edge of my seat and clenching my armrests for its full 105 minute runtime. It is about a group of astronauts on the international space station who are examining a newly discovered species from Mars. I went into this movie with the preconceived notion that it would be another knock off Alien action horror. However, perhaps surprisingly the movie only falls into a few classic horror clichés, using excellent acting instead to build suspense and scare the audience. One of the many aspects I find fresh and new about this movie is its lack of jump scares that a lesser film would shoehorn in as a cheap way to spook viewers. This allows the suspense to rise as we follow each crew member around the space station constantly searching for signs of the alien from Mars. Another excellent aspect of this movie is the opening sequence that lasts for about 12-13 minutes, it is all in one take, this is a very memorable scene as it takes us through the entire of the international space station showing us the different areas and tools they use that will be of use later.

There are a couple of flaws in the film, one of which is the trailer. Increasingly, studios create trailers for films before they have finished editing the movie and they have done this for LIFE. The result is lines in the trailer suggesting very different plot points in the film. I am unsure if this was intentional, to mislead the audience, or an accident of the production schedule. Either way, it's annoying and misleading for the viewer. ...

Another minor flaw was that old chestnut ... losing contact with NASA. This is the space equivalent of "were being attacked, let's call for help, oh no I have no signal on my phone". It detracted from the suspense and took me out of the movie, especially as there doesn't appear to be any rational reason for. The transmission failure, which certainly isn't explained properly. It's disappointing that a whole team of experienced screen writers were unable to find a less clichéd ways of generating tension at that point in the film. But let's not be overly critical of the screen writers. They clearly know you can't have a great horror movie without killing off some of your main characters, cutting through their top billed players like a hot knife through butter.

The ending of this movie (which I won't give away) is fantastic. The film convinces us right up to the final 30 seconds that something is about to occur and just as we give a sigh of relief we are thrown a curveball that sets the polar opposite in motion.

# the garden gnome

whete temperatures are improving, I see many more heads bobbing up and down over the garden fences as more people get out and enjoy their gardens in all their forms.

How aware are we though of the nature and the actual environment around us?

Many of the gardens I see around have trees in them, but how many of us really spend time looking up in the canopy? There's often a whole new world of life up there, bathed in dappled sunlight as the wind rocks and sways the branches.

A whole range of different insects regularly call tree canopies home, and they often differ from those you find on the ground, enjoying your flowers, plants and crops with you.

The initial burst of life in Spring of our garden Blue Tit's as they pair up, mate, have young which hopefully fledge, is followed by what seems silence as they disappear. They haven't though as these Tit families climb into the canopy of trees and gorge themselves on the insects and caterpillars that inhabit that space. So after the current breeding season is complete, look upwards and see if you can spot these family groups.

Maybe do a quick survey and see if different species of birds, not just the Blue Tit's, prefer different species of trees.

So the message of this piece is get out and enjoy your garden, local park, or even woodland. Remember to look upward too. Nature is all around.

The skin is our largest body organ. It works quietly away, constantly renewing itself, shedding dead cells every 28 days. It also provides a barrier against the environment and keeps our insides where they should be!

Which skin technologies really work? Alpha-hydroxy acids These are present in many moisturisers. Their effectiveness depends on concentration. Between 8-15% they are a very effective skin smoother. At strengths of over 15% they are used in chemical peels which should only be carried out by a Dermatologist.

**Trans-retinoic acid** It's been proven to reduce wrinkles, increase epidermal thickness and stimulate collagen deposition. It is effective in serum at very low concentrations but the effect is cumulative, so you will need to view it as a long-term strategy. It's also very sensitive to sun light and breaks down on exposure, and can cause a mild skin reaction so should only be applied at night.

Vitamin C serum This is a highly effective anti-oxidant and wrinkle-reducer but needs to be concentrated (10% or more) and stabilised in order to work. Keep it out of the light and use in the morning. It breaks down on exposure to sunlight so use it under a moisturiser with a high SPF. Use only stabilised, colour-free preparations. If there is a yellow tinge, it's no longer effective.

# COLLECTIONS

About a third of people in the UK own a collection. From water colour miniatures to novelty pens, people like to collect things - but why? Well there isn't one reason. For some, like football fans who



collect club memorabilia, it is a way to express their loyalty; for others, like a coin collector who is proud of a rare find, it can become an obsession. You don't even have to collect something physical: train spotters collect engine numbers and information.

Humans are unique in the way we collect items purely for the satisfaction of seeking out and owning them. It's thought that we started to collect things as early as 12,000 years ago, when our ancestors ceased their nomadic lifestyles and settled in one location. There is much speculation about why we collect, yet little agreement between scientists.

It's true some people collect items like fine art or wine as investments, but the vast majority of collections are not actually worth a lot. There are a couple of interesting theories. One is a phenomenon called the endowment effect, which describes our tendency to value things more once we own them. The other is the concept of contagion, and this applies particularly to celebrity

items because some collectors see such objects as being infused with the essence of the person who owned them.

Collecting can be an absorbing and fun hobby, and can be a good way to make like-minded friends. There are online communities for chatting about your collection. There are also be meet-ups where you can swap or buy additions.

To start a collection choose something that is meaningful to you and works with your budget. I have one friend who collects silly limericks, which cost her nothing, and another who collects aesthetically pleasing glass objects, which can set her back several hundred pounds. Both get great pleasure from their hobby. The choice of things to collect is limitless...so what are you waiting for?

# National Doughnut Week



May 13<sup>th</sup>-19<sup>th</sup> is National Donut week. Who doesn't love a naughty donut? But where did they come from?

The humble doughnut has a convoluted past. The Dutch are credited for inventing them; they are first mentioned in a recipe book back in 1803. Doughnuts as we know first appeared in Manhattan, (originally New Amsterdam). They rejoiced under the unappetizing Dutch name of olykoeks, which translates as oily cakes!

From there history gets a bit hazy. Elizabeth Gregory was a New England ship captain's mother. She made a deepfried dough that incorporated her son's spice cargo of nutmeg and cinnamon, along with lemon rind. One story says she invented it so that the crew could store a pastry on long voyages, and that it might help ward off scurvy and colds! Mrs. Gregory filled the centre of her deep-fried pastries with nuts, probably because that was the part of the dough which might not cook through. Hence they became known as doughnuts!

Her son claimed credit for putting the hole in the doughnut. Some people think he did it to save on ingredients and costs. One nice story has it that the doughnut acquired its hole when, one night in a storm, he needed both hands free so skewered one of his mom's doughnuts on a spoke of his ship's wheel.

In the First World War American soldiers

were made gifts of doughnuts by French women volunteers, to give them a taste of home. The soldiers carried their taste for the sweet treat back to the US when the war ended.

The first doughnut machine was invented by Adolph Levitt, an enterprising Russian refugee who sold fried doughnuts from his bakery to hungry crowds of New York theatre-goers. Doughnut machines were a hit at the 1934 World Fair in Chicago, where they were marketed as the future of food-production. Then a Frenchman named Joe LeBeau, who was struggling financially, sold his secret doughnut and also the name Krispy Kreme, to a store owner named Ishmael Armstrong, who hired his nephew, Vernon Rudolph, and put him to work selling the treats door-todoor. A business legend was born.

By the late 1950s, there were 29 Krispy Kreme store-factories in 12 states. Today they have stores across the world but all the doughnuts are still made to the original recipe.

In the UK the doughnut is enjoying a surge of popularity. You can buy gourmet donuts at specialist shops and independent bakers pride themselves on their own variations. There has never been a better time to be a doughnut-lover.

National donut week has been running for 26 years. It was launched in 1991 by independent baker Christopher Freeman. The aim was to celebrate the donut and raise money for charity. Last year nearly £23000 was raised for The Children's Trust, which supports brain-injured children.

So is it doughnut or donut? The dictionary states 'doughnut' with 'donut' listed as an American variant. But really, who cares? They are delicious and this month you can indulge and help a worthwhile cause. What could be better?


